Homework Questions for Y3: Autumn Term 1

Week 3

W/B 15th September



History: How was life in Britain different in the Stone Age?

Life in the Stone Age was very different to the way we live today. See what information you can find out about the homes people lived in, what clothes they wore, how they communicated with each other and things that they did.

Week 4

W/B 22nd September



History: How did people in the Stone Age get their food?

If you were feeling hungry in Stone Age Britain, you couldn't pop to the shops and buy a snack. So how did people get their food? Can you find out what the Stone Age diet was like? What foods did they eat and how did they get it?

Week 5

W/B 29th September



Art & Design: Can you create a nature collage?

Collect a variety of natural materials such as leaves, flowers, and sticks. Use these materials to create a nature-inspired collage. This is a great way to use different textures and colours to make a unique piece of art. Let's get creative!

Week 6

W/B 6th October



Design Technology: Can you design a card with a light up feature?

This term we will be learning about how to use electrical circuits to create cards that light up! See if you can come up with an exciting design with a light up feature. You will need to think about: what or who the card will be for, which part will light up, what materials it will be made from and which colours you will use.

Week 7

Science: Which plants can you find in your local area?

Have a look around your local area and see which plants you spot. You might want to look in your garden, your local park, or visit some woodlands. Try to find out what the plants are called and any other information about them, such as where they grow, whether they produce flowers or fruits and what type of conditions they prefer.

Geography: Can you create a fact file for a country in Europe?

There are many countries in Europe - choose one that you find interesting and create a fact file. Include useful information about the country such as: the capital city, the country's flag, well-known places to visit, interesting geographical features such as rivers and mountains and what its neighbouring countries are.
